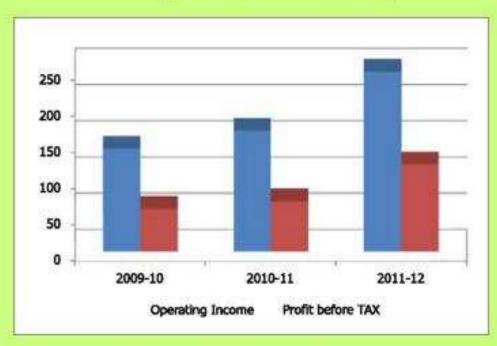


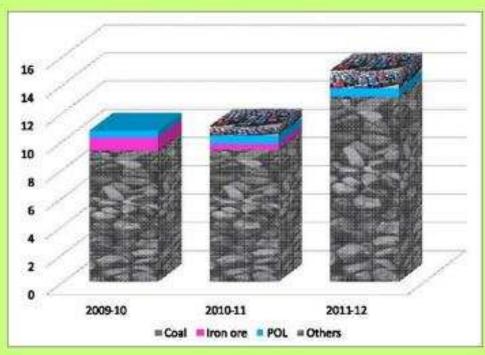

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Dear Shareholders,

I have great pleasure in welcoming you all to the 12th AGM of the Company and to present the Annual Report of the Company for the FY 2011-12. The Directors' Report and the Audited Financial Statements of the Company along with the Auditors' Report for the period ended 31st March 2012 have already been circulated to all the Shareholders. With your permission, I have taken them as read:

Physical Performance of the Company

In terms of cargo composition, thermal coal handled by TNEB continues to be dominant cargo which accounted for 64.36% of the total cargo in 2011-12. Non-TNEB Coal handled during the year 2011-12 was also prevalent which accounted for 23.30%. Car was the next largest cargo in the mix, accounting for 5.91%, closely followed by POL at 5.95%. The productivity in terms of average Turn round time and average ship Berth output has improved during the year.

Highlights of physical performance during

- The total number of 385 vessels were handled in the year under report which is the highest ever since inception of the Port in 2001.
- Average pre-berthing detention on port account was 0.015 hrs as against MOU target of 0.75 hrs.
- The quality of harbour water was as per the prescribed environment norms throughout the year which led to achieving 'Excellent' score in the MOU.
- There was no loss of operative days due to lack of navigational safety for vessels as against the MOU target limit of 48 hours and hence the 'Excellent' score in MOU was realised.
- Capital Dredging Phase-II works to provide a depth of -18 m CD alongside the Iron



Ore Berth, 18 m CD in Port Basin and -20m CD in the channel so that Ennore Port could handle Capesize vessels, was inaugurated by Hon'ble Minister of Shipping on 26th Feb, 2011. A dredging volume of 3.70 Million Cu.M has been completed as on 31st March, 2012, under this scheme.

Financial Performance

During the year ended 31st March 2012 your Company registered a total income of Rs.250.26 crores as against Rs.168.11 crores reported during the previous year reflecting an increase of 48.87%. The operating expenditure incurred during the year 2011-12 was Rs.44.23 crores as against Rs. 32.63 crores during the previous year representing an increase of 26.22%. Profit After Tax (PAT) grew by about 74.01% to Rs.96.72 crores as against Rs. 55.58 crores reported during the previous year.

It gives me great pleasure to mention that your Company has recorded the following milestones:

- a. As per the MOU performance appraisal based on audited figures, the rating shows 'Excellent'.
- the Company has recommended a dividend of 20% on post tax profit.
- iCRA has upgraded the Credit Rating as 'A+' which means the outlook on the rating is

stable for the term loan of Rs.141.75 crores availed by the Company.

Development Plans

The Port has taken up implementation of the projects identified in NMDP as Second Phase development and has been successful in attracting a total investment of Rs.2600 crores on development of various cargo terminals liquid bulk (Rs.250 Cr), Common user coal (Rs.400 Cr) and Iron Ore (Rs.480 Cr) and 1.5 MTEU Container Terminal (Rs.1400 Cr) on PPP-BOT model. EPL has also developed a General Cargo Terminal at an investment of Rs.110 crores. EPL has also planned an ambitious Capex programme of Rs.1852 crores during the next five years in the 12th Five Year Plan on account of common infrastructure facilities to facilitate the commissioning of PPP projects and for other capacity expansion projects mainly Coal Berths for handling TNEB coal. The projects also include deepening of the Port's approach channel to 20 meters for handling Cape Size bulk carriers and augmenting Rail/Road connectivity. Recently Government of Tamil Nadu has signed an MOU with IOCL for setting up a LNG Terminal of 5 MTPA at Ennore Port.

Corporate Governance

I am pleased to inform you that your Company has complied with the Corporate Governance norms as stipulated by the Central Government through the guidelines issued by Department of Public Enterprises and your Company is taking all efforts to adopt the best Corporate Governance practices. Your Company's Director's report contains a separate section on Corporate Governance. Your company is regularly obtaining a certificate on compliance of Corporate Governance from independent agency.

Corporate Social Responsibility

Your Company has Corporate Social Responsibility high on its agenda and is carrying out various activities which are aimed at improving the quality of life of the peripheral area and neighbourhood community. During the year 2011-12, about Rs. 79.75 lakhs was spent in supporting various activities, such as providing livelihood opportunities to rural women in the Port neighbourhood through Self Help Group, construction of additional building of primary school at Attipattu Village, medical camp, cash award to poor meritorious school students, etc.

Women Empowerment

Your Company takes pride in the fact that because of its conscientious efforts, the women employees constitute 15.95% of EPL's work force.

Conclusion

Before concluding I wish to place on record our deep sense of appreciation of the sincere efforts put in by our employees at all levels which enabled your company to record improved performance during the year. I would also like to thank my colleagues on the Board, who spared considerable time and participated actively in the deliberations of the Board with their in depth knowledge and guidance on various issues which greatly contributed in taking appropriate decisions. I gratefully acknowledge the guidance and support extended by Ministry of Shipping for continued growth and expansion of your company. I wish to convey my sincere thanks to our valued Port Users, particularly TNEB & BOT Licensees/Concessionaires for their continued support and cooperation. I also thank the Government of Tamil Nadu, Railways, Chennai Port Trust, IPA, and Banks for their continued support and cooperation.

On behalf of the Board of Directors of your Company, I have great pleasure in presenting the Twelfth Annual Report and Audited Statement of Accounts of the Company for the financial year ended 31* March 2012.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

During the year under review your Company registered a total income of ₹ 250.26 crores as against Rs.168.11 crores reported during the previous year reflecting a growth of 48.87%. The operating expenditure incurred during the year under review is ₹ 44.23 crores as against ₹ 32.63 crores during the previous year reflecting an increase of ₹ 11.59 crores (35.53%). Profit After Tax (PAT) grew by about 74.01% to ₹ .96.72 crores as against ₹ 55.58 crores reported during the previous year.

MOUPERFORMANCE FOR 2011-12

Your Company signed Memorandum of Understanding with Government of India, Ministry of Shipping for the fiscal 2011-12 on 14th March, 2011 and excelled in performance in various parameters covered under the MOU. As per the provisional assessment, the rating is "Excellent", for the fifth time in succession.

FINANCE

During the year under review, your Company has repaid installments of term loans amounting to ₹23.11 crores which had become due during the current year. Your Company has also made fresh borrowings of Rs.20 crores to finance capital expenditure requirements.

DIVIDEND

The Board of Directors has recommended a dividend of 20% on post tax profits which is equivalent to ₹ 0.65 per share keeping in mind the need to conserve resources. The dividend will absorb a sum of ₹ 22.48 crores including dividend distribution tax and surcharge thereon.

OPERATIONS

Your Port has 6 berths as of now capable of serving the varied needs of the maritime industry. The cargo throughput of your Port went up by 35.85 per cent at 14.956 million tonnes compared to 11.009 million tonnes in 2010-11, mainly on account of increase in coal handling at Common User Coal Terminal.

CAPTIVE USER TERMINAL

Coal handling at the two coal berths dedicated to TANGEDCO/Tamil Nadu Electricity Board (TNEB) continued to remain the prime cargo at your Port, and performed well, compared to previous year.

DEVELOPMENT PLANS

Your Company has a total capacity of 29.5 million tonnes plus two lacs cars per annum. Since the construction works of new power plants of TNEB and NTECL (JV of TNEB and NTPC) are in advanced stage of completion, TNEB/NTPC will augment the handling of capacity of CB2 to 8 million tonnes from the present 4 million tonnes capacity by the year 2012-13. Taking this into account, the cargo handling capacity of Ennore Port will raise to 33.5 million tonnes plus two lacs cars by the year 2012-13. Further, the Ennore Port will continue to augment capacity as per its strategy which inter-alia includes capacity addition through expansion of capacity of existing berths, green field PPP-BOT projects and own projects and encouraging of captive use of facilities.

MARINE LIQUID TERMINAL

Quantum of liquid cargoes handled at your Port remained more or less at the same level as that of the previous year. However, it is expected to handle more cargo in the coming year as the import of envisaged LPG, etc. are expected to commence soon.

COMMON USER COAL TERMINAL

Your Company had signed a License Agreement for handling coal to the consumers other than TNEB, on a 30 year BOT basis, in September 2006 with the project company Chettinad International Coal Terminal Pvt. Ltd (CICTPL) with an approved project cost of ₹399.13 crores. The Licensee has developed a terminal with a cargo handling capacity of 8 MTPA. The commercial operations began from 11th March 2011. During the first full year of operation, CICTPL handled 3.49 MT of coal.

General Cargo Berth cum Automobile Export Terminal:

Your company has set up a berth for car export and for other general cargo, at an estimated cost of ₹ 110 crores. This berth will be able to accommodate the world's largest car carrier of capacity of 8,000 cars. Further it has a back-up area of about 1,41,000 sq.m with an expansive car parking yard for 10000 cars which is the largest facility in any Indian Port. During the first full year of operation the terminal handled 103576 cars, 48 buses and 43 trucks.

Your company had signed an agreement for an Iron Ore terminal on a 30 years BOT basis on 23st September 2006 with the project company SICAL Iron ore Terminal Limited with an approved project cost of ₹ 480 crores in two phases of 6 million tonnes each. The Licensee has developed the first phase of 6 MTPA capacity at an investment of ₹ 360 crores. The commissioning activities depend on the permits on the movement of export of Iron Ore by State Government of Karnataka and Hon'ble Supreme Court.

Capital Dredging-Phase-II:

The work was awarded to M/s Dredging Corporation of India (DCI) at a value of ₹ 171 crores and commenced on 26.2.2011. The Project envisages deepening of Ennore Port Channel from the existing 16m to 20m and the Basin to 18.5m from the existing depths 15.5m and the Iron Ore berth area to 18m from the existing 15m. After deepening, Ennore Port would be able to handle Cape size vessels of 1,50,000 DWT at iron ore berth. Dredging work is in progress.

To meet the growing demand in the hinterland and trade, Ennore Port has initiated action for developing the following terminals through BOT/Captive basis

Container Terminal (1.5 MTEUs/18 MTPA):

A Concession Agreement for development of Container Terminal at Ennore Port was signed with the Concessionaire, M/s Bay of Bengal Gateway Terminal Pvt. Ltd. on 13.8.2010 at an estimated cost of ₹ 1407 crs. with a capacity of 1.50 Million TEUs. As per the Concession Agreement, the Concessionaire has to fulfill the conditions precedent within a period of 180 days from the date of signing of the Concession Agreement. On the failure to achieve the Conditions Precedent within the normal period of 180 days, the Concessionaire has granted three more extension for a total period of 445 days by invoking the provisions of Article 3.3 of the Concession Agreement for fulfilling the Conditions Precedent. In spite of granting repeated extension of time, the Concessionaire failed to fulfill the Conditions Precedent. While communicating the last extension of time to the Concessionaire, your company vide letter dated 12th March 2012, has informed the Concessionaire that failure to fulfill the conditions precedent within the above extended period would constrain EPL to invoke Article 3.6 of the Concession Agreement, i.e. forfeiture of bid security and termination of the

agreement. Since the Concessionaire failed to achieve the financial closure even by the last extended date i.e. 30th April, 2012, EPL by invoking the aforesaid Article of the Concession Agreement has encashed the bid security to the value of ₹ 14 crores furnished by the Concessionaire.

LNG Terminal (5 MTPA):

Indian Oil Corporation Limited (IOCL) had identified Ennore as a possible location for a LNG terminal and had carried out a Feasibility Study for setting up the LNG Terminal with regassification facilities. EPL also obtained "in principle" approval of the Government in July 2005, for IOCL to set up this LNG terminal. IOCL has already appointed Consultants to carry out the detailed engineering study (FEED) and Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) study.

The Board of Directors of your Company in its Board Meeting held on 10.2.2012 has approved the draft MOU to be entered into between the Indian Oil Corporation Limited and Ennore Port Limited for setting up of the LNG Terminal at Ennore Port. The draft MoU has been forwarded to the Ministry of Shipping for its approval.

The anticipated date of commencement of construction is 2013-14 and commissioning by 2016-17.

Coal berth 3 for TNEB of 9 MTPA

With the ongoing expansion of North Chennai Thermal Power Station (NCTPS)/ Mettur Thermal Power Station (MTPS) / Ennore Thermal Power Station (ETPS), there will be additional traffic at Your Port. Hence Your Company has already initiated action for developing the third coal berth with a capacity of 9 MTPA. The anticipated date of commencement is during the financial year 2013-14.

Capital Dredging-Phase-III

Capital dredging Phase-III involves dredging of about 10 million cubic meters for providing - 16 meters alongside depth at Container Terminal at an estimated cost of ₹ 220 crores. This will be taken up in synchronization with container berth construction.

CONNECTIVIY

Road Connectivity

Your Company is also drawing up and crystallizing plans for improving the Road connectivity to the Port. The SPV namely Chennai Ennore Port Road Company Limited (CEPRCL) promoted by Ennore Port Ltd, Government of Tamil Nadu, Chennai Port Trust and NHAI has already taken up four laning of TPP road for which the company has committed to contribute ₹ 34.02 crores, out of which ₹ 17.50 crores has already been paid. The project works were awarded by the SPV Company and construction work is in progress.

A new Northern Port Access Road from Port's North Gate to Tachur on NH5 was proposed by the Company and it was taken up by NHAI under the 'Port Connectivity to the Golden Quadrilateral or North-South & East-West Corridors' programme. NHAI had proposed to implement the project on PPP model and EPL was to bear the cost of land acquisition, etc. for the project. NHAI had taken action to select the concessionaire. Now Govt. of Tamil Nadu has proposed to take up the project on commercial format and for incurring land acquisition cost.



Shri. T.K.A. Nair, Advisor to the Prime Minister, visited Ennove Port, on 26.11.2011 and held discussions with Shri. S. Veiumani, CMD and other Senior Officials of EPL on Chennal - Bangalore Industrial corridor and Port Connectivity Issues.

Rail Connectivity

Your company is connected to the Southern Railway network at Attipattu and Attipattu Pudhunagar Railway Stations, at about 6km from the Port, on the Chennai-Gudur section of the Southern Railways.

Rail connectivity between Your Port and mainlines of Indian Railways (Ennore Port to Attipattu and Attipattu Pudhunagar Railway Stations) to coal / iron ore stackyards at a total estimated cost of ₹80 crores is in progress. Your company is planning to provide rail connectivity to the proposed Container Terminal from the Indian Railways mainline for rail movement of container traffic at an estimated cost of ₹40 crores.

A new BG Railway line between Puthur and Attipattu costing ₹ 446 crores has been approved by Govt. of India. Your company is to meet 50% share of this project cost. This project was envisaged with a view to facilitate iron ore movement from Bellary Hospet region to reach your Port without entering the congested Arakkonam-Chennai sector, reducing the distance by 37km and thereby achieving

reduction in freight cost. Subsequently, a draft Concession Agreement for financing and implementation of such projects is under finalisation by Ministry of Railways. EPL is awaiting final Concession Agreement for taking up the Puttur-Athipattu line with an additional line to Tiruvallur in the 1* phase and then laying line up to Puttur in 2rd phase. EPL is pursuing with the Ministry of Railways to finalize this project expeditiously.

INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS

During the year under review cordial and harmonious Industrial Relations were maintained in the Company and no man day was lost on account of industrial unrest.

EPL has its own grievance redressal procedure for Executives as well as non-executive employees. The grievances of employees are accordingly dealt with as per the rule.

WOMEN EMPOWERMENT

Your Company has 15 women employees which constitute 15.95% of its total workforce of 94 as on 31.03.2012.

The women employees are facilitated to perform and display their efficiencies to the betterment of the organization as well as self improvement. Your company is taking all measures to implement the policy to curb Sexual Harassment of women workers at work place. No case of any harassment has since been reported at any time in your company. Various cultural, social, educative and community activities, such as adult educating, blood donation camps, eye camps, etc. are being organised regularly mostly for the benefit of the women residing in the neighbouring areas.

Every year 8th March is celebrated as International Women's Day and various programmes are organised with the active employment of women employees to mark the day. Company has enhanced the period of Maternity Leave from 90 days to 180 days.

120 Self Help Group comprising women hailing from surrounding villages are provided livelihood opportunity in the Port for several years in the past.

CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

It has been your Company's conscious and continuous endeavour to contribute to the community development and services. Towards its commitment to the society, your Company has taken up various activities as detailed below:

- Providing infrastructure and other facilities to neighbouring schools at a cost of ₹19.18 lakhs.
- Village link road connecting Athipattu Pudu Nagar Railway Station to main road at a cost of ₹22.51 lakhs.
- Providing financial assistance to Self-Help women's group to the tune of ₹34.52 lakhs
- One time contribution of ₹ 3,00,000/- has been made to CSR hub.

During the year under review a total sum of ₹ 79.21 lakhs excluding CSR training expenses of ₹ 54,425/- was spent by EPL on account of Corporate Social Responsibility activities. However, the Company would make all efforts to ensure that the expenses on CSR during the financial year 2012-13, would be in accordance with the DPE Guidelines on CSR for CPSEs which prescribes 3% to 5% of PAT of the previous financial year.

RIGHT TO INFORMATION ACT, 2005 (RTI ACT)

An effective mechanism has been set up in the organization to deal with the requests received under the RTI Act, 2005.

EPL has appointed a PIO and a Transparency Officer at the Corporate Office to look after the compliances of RTI Act, 2005. Director (Operations) has been appointed/designated as Appellate Authority under the Act.

During the year under report, the Company has received total 20 No. of applications under RTI Act, from which 19 Applications accepted, 1 rejected and one appeal accepted under RTI and the same had been disposed off during the period.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Your Company has implemented with an investment of ₹ 92 Lakhs on Port Operation Management System (POMS) developed by National Informatics Centre (NIC), Government of India and started exchanging messages with Port Users like Shipping Agents for Registration Ships Certificates, Voyage Registration, Berth Request, etc., through Port Community System (PCS) developed by Indian Ports Association (IPA). Your Port will start collecting Port Charges through e-payment of PCS, start exchange of messages with Customs and start issuing Port Clearance for vessels through PCS once dedicated Customs Office and EDI are established by Customs Department at Ennore Port.

Your Company has taken up the implementation of Phase-II implementation of ERP System covering other activities like Accounts, Finance, Human Resource Management, Payroll, Procurement & Maintenance, Project & Contract Management, Estate Management, etc., in a phased manner at an investment of ₹81.29 lakhs. Action plan-'Tobe Report' was completed in July 2011 and training was given to all employees for e-publishing and e-procurement modules in February 2012. Implementation of other modules is in progress.

This entire exercise will ensure Standardization of business transactions and documentation and efficient Procedure & Process along with more transparency.

IMPLEMENTATION OF OFFICIAL LANGUAGE

Your Company has made focused efforts for the propagation and implementation of the official language policy of the GoI. All important circulars/advertisements and correspondences were issued in Hindi. Employees are encouraged to undergo Hindi courses conducted by Central Hindi Directorate.

DIRECTORS

Subsequent to the last Directors' Report, Capt. D.K. Mohanty, Director (Marine Services) resigned from the Board w.e.f 30.11.2011. After resignation of Capt. D.K. Mohanty, Director (Marine Services) there is no change in the composition of the Board of Directors of your company and the present composition of board consists of Two Whole-time Directors including Chairman-cum-Managing Director, two Government Nominee Directors and three Independent Directors.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 255 & 256 of the Companies Act, 1956 and in accordance with clause 140 (a) of Articles of Association of the Company two Directors, other than Managing Director and Whole-time Directors have to retire by rotation, who have been longest in office since the date of last appointment at the ensuing Annual General Meeting. Accordingly Mr. Atulya Misra, Director and Mr. ARRao, Independent Director shall retire by rotation at the Annual General Meeting of your Company and being eligible, offer themselves for re-appointment.

Management Discussion and Analysis Report 2011-2012

- A. Industry Structure, Market-Scenario, Opportunities & Threats, Outlook, Risks and Concerns.
- ♦ Industry Structure and Market Scenario:

Ennore Port is operating as a landlord port limiting its functions to overall planning, development, mobilization of investments for development, conservancy of port, regulatory aspects, environment monitoring, providing / operating basic utilities (water, electricity supply, fire fighting facilities, security etc.) providing rail / road connectivity etc. The development and operations of the terminals are entrusted to private operators. All the future terminal developments are proposed through private sector participation. Many of the services are carried out by outsourcing.

Indian economy is clouded by some slowdown in growth in the current year with continuing concern about inflation and a sudden increase in uncertainty about the global economy particularly in EURO Zone

Although the Indian economy has performed well averaging 8.2% in the first four years in 11th plan period, growth in 2011-12 in final year of the 11th plan is registering a decelerated rate of growth and currently stands at 6.9% as against the projection of 9%

◆ Strength and Weakness

Strength:

- Landlord Model wherein cargo operations are vested with the private operators who bring capital and efficiency in operations.
- Deep draft port facilitates berthing of large size and new generation vessels resulting in reduced freight rate and saving in time.

- Proximity to National Highways and Indian Railways mainlines providing excellent connectivity to hinterland.
- Fully mechanised cargo handling operations.
- Enough back up land for storage of cargo.

Weakness:

- The captive User TNEB and the BOT operators are responsible for day to day cargo handling operations. Hence EPL's role is limited in volume / throughput to be handled
- Movement of Iron ore from Bellary-Hospet region was banned by the Government of Karnataka. Consequently export from this region is totally affected.
- The development of common infrastructure facilities like capital dredging, road & rail connectivity is vested with EPL for which huge amount of funds are raised from the market with no government assistance/ grant.
- Raising of fresh funds on the strength of port assets is limited on account of BOT performances.
- Opportunities and Threats

Opportunities:

- Market demand for Coal to feed Thermal Power Stations and Industries.
- Still a potential market for Iron Ore export.
- Market demand for Containerized traffic.
- Port is surrounded by a member of Container Freight Stations and Industries.

 Least populated neighbourhood area and availability of large tracts of land to trigger further port based developments.

Threats:

- Emergence of non major ports like L&T at Kattupalli, Krishnapatnam and Karaikal Ports competing to EPL's hinterland.
- No clear-cut policy on development of nonmajor ports particularly licensing of nonmajor port in the vicinity of major ports.
- Movement of Iron ore from bellary-hospet region was banned by the Government of Karnataka and the Hon'ble Supreme Court. Consequently export from this region is affected.

* Outlook

The traffic at major ports of India is likely to grow to 1215 million tonnes by 2020 from the present level of 561 million tonnes whereas the traffic at non-major ports is expected to grow 1280 million tonnes in the same period from the present level of 289 million tonnes. Thus the anticipated traffic at Indian Ports would grow to 2494 million tonnes by 2020 from the present level of 850 million tonnes at CAGR of 11.37%. Having set the tune for the growth plan, both the major ports and non-major ports have formulated ambitious plans in order to meet the growing opportunities in the EXIM trade (Source Maritime Agenda 2020 by MOS, Gol)

The Traffic forecast for the Company has been made for the period of 20 years from 2007-08 to 2026-27. The principal items of Cargo to be handled at Ennore Port comprise of Coal (for TNEB and non-TNEB), Iron Ore, POL & bulk liquids and Containers.

For the financial year 2012-13, EPL has projected the Gross Sales 10% more than expected achievement in 2011-12. Accordingly all the financial parameters are worked out.

* Risks and Concerns

The port sector is all set to witness intense competition with the advent of many private ports being developed under State Maritime Boards.

EPL is fully prepared to match their investment, operations and pricing strategies so as to ensure adequate growth by roping in private sector in development and operations of the various cargo terminals.

Notes forming part of the Financial Statements for the year ended 31st March 2012

1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

Ennore Port Limited (the Company) is a public Company domiciled in India and incorporated under the provisions of Companies Act, 1956. The Company is operating as a landlord port limiting its functions to overall planning, development, mobilization of investments for the development of port and other infrastructure activities. The development and operations of the terminals are mostly entrusted to private opeartors / captive users.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

The financial statements of the company have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles in India (Indian GAAP). The company has prepared these financial statements to comply in all material respects with the accounting standards notified under the Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2006, (as amended) and the relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 1956. The financial statements have been prepared on mercantile basis and under the historical cost convention.

PRESENTATION AND DISCLOSURE OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

During the year ended March 31, 2012, the revised Schedule VI notified under the Companies Act, 1956, has become applicable to the Company, for preparation and presentation of its financial statements. The adoption of revised schedule VI does not impact recognition and measurement principles followed for preparation and disclosures made in the financial statements. However, it has significant impact on presentation and disclosures made in the financial statements. The Company has also reclassified the previous year figures in accordance with the requirements applicable in the current year.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

a. GENERAL:

The financial statements are prepared on historical cost convention and on mercantile system of accounting in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

b. REVENUE RECOGNITION:

Income is recognized upon completion of services rendered and no significant uncertainty exists regarding the amount of consideration that would be derived after rendering the service. Upfront fee received from the BOT operator is treated as Revenue in the year in which zero date of the Project is fixed. Interest income on the disputed revenue will be recognised on realisation basis.

c. FIXED ASSETS:

(i) TANGIBLE ASSETS:

Fixed assets are stated at cost of acquisition, including any attributable cost for bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use, less accumulated depreciation. Expenses capitalised also include applicable borrowing costs. In respect of major projects involving construction, related pre-operational expenses form part of the value of assets capitalised. All upgradation/enhancements are generally charged off as revenue expenditure unless they bring similar significant additional benefits.

The amounts becoming payable by the company on account of uncontested arbitral awards on project claims are capitalized in the year of award as additions during the year in the respective asset. The interest on such awards payable to the contractor is treated as revenue expenditure in the year of award.

(II) INTANGIBLE ASSETS:

Intangible assets are stated at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses, if any. Cost comprises the purchase price and any cost attributable for bringing the assets to its working condition for its intendend use. Amortisation is provided on Straight Line Method (SLM), which reflect the management's estimate of the useful life of the intangible assets.

d. DEPRECIATION:

Depreciation is provided on Straight Line Method at the rates and in the manner specified in the Schedule XIV of the Companies Act, 1956. Assets costing individually Rs.5000/- and below are fully depreciated in the year of addition. Where no rates are specified for any port specific asset, the depreciation is charged at the rate as determined in accordance with the life of those assets as per the practice prevailing in Major Ports in India. Depreciation on addition in value of assets due to arbitral awards is claimed over the remaining useful life of the assets from the start of the financial year in which such award is passed and accepted.

e. INVESTMENTS:

Long Term Investments are stated at cost except where there is a diminution in value other than temporary, in which case the carrying value is reduced to recognize the decline. Current investments are stated at lower of cost or fair market value.

f. DEFERRED REVENUE EXPENDITURE:

Preliminary Expenses and Deferred Revenue Expenses are written off over a period of five years equally.

a. ACCOUNTING FOR TAXES ON INCOME:

Current tax is determined as the amount of tax payable in respect of taxable income for the period.

Deferred tax is recognized, on timing differences, being the differences between taxable income and accounting income that originate in one period and are capable of reversal in one or more subsequent periods. Deferred tax assets are not determined on unabsorbed depreciation and carry forward of losses unless there is virtual certainty that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which such deferred tax assets can be realized.

h. RETIREMENT BENEFITS:

Provisions for gratuity, pension and leave salary have been made as per the service conditions and on the basis of actuarial valuation and for those employees who are on deputation from other organizations as per the advice received from the respective organizations.

I. FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSACTIONS:

Foreign currency transactions are recorded in Indian currency at the exchange rates prevailing on the respective dates of transactions. Monetary items are denominated in foreign currencies at the year-end are restated at year-end rates. Non-monetary foreign currency items are carried at cost. Any income or expense on account of exchange difference either on settlement or on translation is recognized in the profit and loss account.

i. PREPAID EXPENSES:

Revenue expenditure under each head are segregated into current year and prepaid wherever the amount exceeds Rs.20,000/-

k. PREMIA FOR FORECLOSURE:

Premia for foreclosure of loans or any part thereof is charged to revenue in the year in which the foreclosure is effected.

I. BORROWING COST:

Borrowing Cost are capitalised as part of the cost of a qualifying asset when it will result in future economic benefits to the company. Other borrowing costs are recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred.

m. MAINTENANCE DREDGING:

Expenditure for the maintenance dredging is provided every year based on the estimated quantity as assessed from the Hydrographic Survey Report and as per market rate based cost of such maintenance dredging. The adjustment entries will be made in the year in which actual maintenance dredging expenditure was incurred.

n. LIQUIDATED DAMAGES:

Liquidated damages recovered on certainty basis. In respect of Capital Projects, the same will be reduced from the Capitalisation of Asset and on all other cases, recognized as Other Income.
